Represented almost entirely through dialogue.	"White man" and a "dog on a chain" may evoke slavery. "Granny" is a very familiar term for a stranger. Could be respectful or disrespectful – the author leaves the nature of this address ambiguous. Long before he points the gun at her, the scene evokes anxiety.	His cheerful tone has a cruel subtext that belies his sense of his superiority and his right to tease Phoenix. His pointing the gun at her seals his vilification makes unmistakable his desire to exercise power over her.
